

FAQ – frequently asked questions

Please read the following questions for answers to the most common queries from applicants to the programme. If you don't find the information you need, please send an e-mail stating that you have read the FAQ without finding an answer to your question.

Application procedure

1) I have a BSc in psychology or physiotherapy. Am I qualified for the Programme?

The entry requirements are listed on the website. You need to evaluate your own qualifications with regard to the requirements. We primarily accept students with a background in sport sciences.

2) What are my chances of being admitted to the Programme?

Last year we received about 750 applications. We don't know how many will apply this year and we don't know their qualifications, so we are unable to respond to inquiries on the chances of admission.

3) I speak English fluently. Do I need to prove it by taking the TOEFL test?

If you have a degree from a university in an English-speaking country, you don't need to prove your language skills. In all other cases you need to pass the test with the stipulated score.

4) Can you help me find somewhere to stay?

Accepted on the Programme

1) I applied for a visa to Sweden several weeks ago, but have heard nothing from the Swedish Migration Board. Can you help me?

The Swedish Migration Board is an independent government agency, to which all queries regarding immigration procedures and formalities should be directly addressed. We cannot influence their work.

2) What jobs can I expect to get after the Programme?

3) I have been accepted on the Programme, but cannot be in Lund when it starts. What is the deadline for entering the Programme?

We expect students who, due to external factors, cannot be present at the start of the Programme, to enrol no later than two weeks after the start.

4) How expensive is the course literature, and do I have to buy books?

In general, course literature is relatively expensive. A few copies of the course literature are available at the library. We recommend that you buy or borrow the course literature in order to benefit from the Programme as much as possible. In any case, exams are based on the course literature.

Studying on the Programme

1) When and at what times do I have to be present during my studies?

The Programme is based on full time studies from about 1st September to about 5th June. This means that you are expected to be available from 8:00-17:00 Monday-Friday during the whole academic year, which covers 40 weeks. Please consult the schedule for each course in order to decide when to take time off, for example, for Christmas holidays.

2) I cannot be present at the lectures on (dates). Can you tell me what literature I should read, etc.?

The Master's programme is a full-time programme, which means that students need to be available Monday through Friday from 8:00–17:00 during the academic year which covers 40 weeks. If you are not present during this time, it is your responsibility to take care of missed studies, for example by asking fellow students. Teachers are unable to spend extra time on individual solutions, unless by special agreement, or on tasks which emanate from the absence of the student.
